A New Life Banner

While I was ministering at Mt Eliza in the 1990's, the Uniting Church was blessed with many gifted people. Among them was Norma, a talented artist, who was happy to enrich our worship with her art. One time, when John 12:20-26 was a lectionary reading, she asked me if I would be happy to have her paint a banner about it. I happily agreed; and was pleasantly surprised by not one but three banners illustrating verse 24: "Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." They enhanced our worship significantly.

When leaving Mt Eliza in 1999, Norma insisted I take the banners with me: "Perhaps you will be able to use them again, Alan." They have been used a number of times since: as metaphors for Easter, for new life, and for baptism.

Now that I have less opportunity to use them, I spoke with Norma recently and we agreed that it would good to pass them on for other people to enjoy. So, I have given them to HSUC; and David asked that they be hung the week after Pentecost Sunday. As you will see, they have been joined one to another. May they be a blessing to you.

PENTECOST!

What a weird - but wonderful time it was!

We'd followed Jesus and seen him do things that were weird - but wonderful. We'd watched him get arrested and die on the cross. Then there was that weird - but wonderful! Sunday when he came back to life! After a picnic on the beach which was weird - but wonderful, Jesus took us up a hill outside the city here, and he said goodbye, promising he would be with us always - what a weird - but wonderful thing to say when he just ... disappeared!

And we were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and we started speaking in languages we didn't know we could speak.

Weird - but wonderful.

And people from different countries in the street heard us and were amazed that they could understand what we were saying. Some said we were drunk. Others said Weird - but wonderful.

So we kept meeting together to try to work out what weird - **but wonderful** thing was going to happen next. And about a week after Jesus had left us, something weird - **but wonderful** did happen!

Then Peter got up and told everyone that this was God's Holy Spirit at work, helping us all to have Jesus alive in us. And the crowds believed him. And do you know, about three thousand people became Christians that very day and the church was born. And the same Holy Spirit helps us to have Jesus alive in us today!

We were all in a room in Jerusalem, when suddenly there was this weird - but wonderful noise, like a rushing wind. It was coming from heaven, and the noise filled the whole house. Filled each of us up too - it was like we were floppy balloons being filled with air! Weird - but wonderful!

success is a very socially charged ideal. Unless true success is understood, and the gauge of its measurement clearly defined, its misinterpreted concepts have the capacity to send the seeker of its treasures down a perilous path of indignation and greed. Once unreal expectations that typically suggest the acquisition of fiduciary windfalls reflect its measurement are erased from thought; only then can arguments be made that indeed, it is not judged on the wealth of coin, but, in the investment of spirit toward supportive ideals. I would like to highlight this point by using myself as the example.

I have struggled with the ideals of success, perhaps because of societal misconceptions reliant on what seemed an out-dated basis from which success should be measured; that of financial prosperity. This archaic extension in fiscal hyperbole manifested unrealistic perceptions on how I was to judge my own personal success. Indeed, whilst working in collusion with a lack of personal confidence that stunted emotional growth I was unable to believe in the value of my own selfworth.

Only when I started to understand my unrealistic perceptions on my worth as an individual and reevaluated my own consciousness, including new found - yet familiar patterns of thought did insights begin to unveil themselves. Deciding to be the change my life that I wanted to see; my self-worth, my mothership, my soul, started to manifest bountiful wisdoms that as a rule, I try to live every day. This newfound self-worth started to manifest personal and emotional success from which now my spirit creates profit.

Self-worth is a denomination of currency we should all strive to earn and maintain. Self-worth is a phenomenal precursor earnt through sacrifice, its addition substantiates the investment in life and the lives of others. If you can find accomplishment in learning your self-worth, maintaining its existence and

passing on its providence to others, I believe everything else will fall into place.

Self-worth also validates the notion of individuality, dictating that we all are diverse and unique creatures of divine destiny. We all can't be Steve Jobs or Mother Teresa, and that's okay. Rather than worrying about being a flamingo amongst a flock of pigeons; just be the best bloody pigeon you can be. Indeed, learn from those you look up to, take on board elements of their life that you identify with; but make your life your own.

Living your personal truth has a value that money can't buy. So priceless are the riches provided by a true sense of accomplishment. At times perhaps, the only difficulty can be sustaining the belief that you are worthy. Allow validation of this perception, for this validation is a gentle reminder of your humility, indicating to its host, that your intent is true and as worthwhile as your life. Permit this reassurance to validate that you are on a path of selfless and self-filled valour; rather than a journey of the selfish.

Can I leave you with a reflection; some food for thought? Surely if one can travel through life knowing they are living their authentic truth and maintaining its presence through-out hardships and times of prosperity. Success can be found whilst trying and doing one's best to enrich the lives of others. Success is the kind and gentle hand that reaches out to others regardless of the locale. Finally, purpose indeed fills the self with a powerful sense of success. Then with conviction can it be stated that one's life is a success; full of practical and passionate purpose.

TREASURER'S REPORT


Eva Lanyon Bequest: We have finally received the money from this bequest,


amounting to just over \$160,000. As foreshadowed at the AGM in March, this has enabled us to payout the balance (just under \$150,000) on the Development Loan from Synod which allowed us to redevelop our current site some 15 years ago. This loan was being paid off from the lease of the Wesley site to the Brotherhood of St Laurence. The money released, some \$30000 per annum, will enable us to cover the employment of our new Youth Coordinator, Hannah.

There will a recognition of Eva's bequest as part of the Trust Giving Service on Sunday 24th June. Eva was a very regular part of our congregation when she lived at Long Island Retirement Village. She died in early 2016.

Easter Offerings: The open plate offerings from the Easter Services amounted to \$1000.45 and this has been forwarded to the Synod Lenten Offering which is funding a number of projects in Victoria and Tasmania.
