FROM THE MINISTER.....

Through January and February we have been looking at the first part of Matthew's gospel, beginning with his birth, his family's escape as



refugees to Egypt, their return, and Jesus' baptism and the affirmation by God that he is beloved, as God's Son. Then followed his time of preparation through fasting and prayer, during which he resisted the temptations to base his identity on what he did and controlled, how others responded to him, or what security he could have (specifically: making bread from stones, getting angels to catch him, or 'having the world').

The Sermon on the Mount then gave us a series of teachings on which to found our lives – the conclusion of the sermon being that by hearing those words and acting on them we would be like the one who "built their house on the rock". The Sermon included teaching on how God blesses a very broad range of people who don't necessarily have it all together and who long for justice and peace. Out of the knowledge of that blessing that we are God's beloved, we do more than just follow a bunch of laws: our relationship with others come from our God-founded hearts. Jesus' teaching on prayer and living with discernment but not judgement follows.

In March and April we move towards Lent and Easter, when we are confronted by the reality of sin and the rejection of Jesus. During Lent, I plan to offer time for people to experience silent prayer, in the company of others. I am planning for a silent prayer time at 10:00am on Friday mornings in the chapel, from Friday 8 March until Easter. Along with a Bible reading, this will involve 20 minutes of silence. This can be quite confronting, and it will be OK to come and go during that time, but as much as you are able it is an **opportunity to simple come and focus on being before God, in all of God's love, in the** company of others.

I'm glad to be getting some feedback already about service times, following the discussion paper that was circulated in last month's High Street Times. We plan to bring two options to the AGM on 17 March at 10:00am. The Uniting Church uses a consensus decision making process, rather than "voting" as such, which means that we try to listen to each other, hear various people's concerns, and then try together to discern the best way forward. When a particular proposal is put, if a majority are positive about it but a few people are opposed, those people have the opportunity to make sure that their views have been heard, which may lead to a revision and a re-testing of the proposal. If we aren't able to come to consensus, those with the minority view can be asked if they feel heard, and whether they are prepared to agree that the majority view prevail without recording the decision as consensus. If that agreement cannot be made, then if a decision is required we can move to a formal majority process as a "last resort". My hope is that we will listen well to each other and come to consensus about what will be best for the accessibility of the church for all who want to participate in worship.

END OF AN ERA for SHOWBIZ



Sharing about Pancake day and Lent with kids:

Lent is the 40 days before Easter. In case you try and count the days, take note that the 40 days doesn't include Sundays. It is a great time to talk with your children about the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness, getting ready for his ministry. Traditionally, it is regarded as a time of denial (hence why there's a the tradition of 'giving something up' for Lent) and repentance. It can help children to understand more about the purpose of Lent if you also talk in terms of it being a time of 'getting ready'. We are getting ready to celebrate the great festival of Easter, just as Advent is a time of 'getting ready' to celebrate Christmas. The story of Jesus in the wilderness can be found in Matthew chapter 4, verses 1 to 11.

Shrove Tuesday

The day before Lent starts is Shrove Tuesday, commonly known as "Pancake Day". *Shrove* means pronounced forgiven for sins. Many years ago, people would go to church to be *shriven*, on the day before Lent starts, to

confess their sins and receive forgiveness. Because Lent would be a time of fasting or meagre eating, pancakes were a means of using up all fine flour, eggs and milk in the house, in preparation.

Here's some Food for thought.

When something *important* is about to happen, you need time to get ready.

The events of Good Friday and Easter are so *important*, that the Church has decided it needs six weeks to get ready!

People get ready in different ways.

The church often uses purple as the colour for getting ready.

Some people decide to spend more time listening to God in prayer.

Some people decide to give up something they normally like doing - like eating sweets or watching TV - so they can remember that God's gift of Easter is the most important thing ever.

Some people use the time to think more carefully about the stories of Jesus as he travelled towards Jerusalem and all that is going to happen at Easter time.

Some people use this time to do something extra for others who are in need, such as going without a meal and giving the money saved to a special cause instead.

The events of Good Friday and Easter are the core foundations of part of what people of Christian faith believe and are so mysterious that people set aside time every year to try and understand more about it and be ready for it.

shadow of what that person had been to the church community. People who had lost loved ones was another priority of course and there sadly, there were too many of these.

I have enjoyed so much of the visiting and getting to know people, and remind you again, I'm still going to be around as a member of the community, as a retired minister, a friend, and helper at Tuesday Communion. I enjoy meeting people for coffee, and will still do that, the only difference, you ask me when you'd like a catch up!.

I'm pleased that Arthur will be taking on the role, he's rather well experienced! Big thankyou to David for being an excellent colleague and minister,



AN UPDATE FROM THE MONASH UNIVERSITY CHAPLAIN

Here we are at the beginning of a new university year, and it doesn't seem any time at all since a busy and enjoyable Semester 2 in 2018! Just a few words to let

you know what I've been up to, and some of what I will be doing soon!

I attended the national Tertiary Chaplains Ministry Association conference in Sydney, in November, which was an excellent opportunity to gather together with others doing similar work in different universities around Australia. We listened to some great speakers, held multi-faith worship/reflections, shared stories, learned from each other, and supported each other, and I came away feeling both affirmed about what I am already doing, and excited about some new possibilities.

Following some annual leave over Christmas, I returned to work mid-January, with many of the staff gearing up for the new year.

The most important event coming up is Orientation Week for new students beginning Monday 25th **February, where students attend an official "welcome"** event, attend information sessions for their courses, and enjoy free activities and **food organised by the student union.** It's a fun but important week before Semester 1 and the real work starts on 4th March! This year I am involved again in several of the information sessions, to let students know about the availability of the chaplaincy service, along with other services such as counselling, disability support, English language support, and so on.

I have also been invited to be more involved with international students this year – a growing group at Peninsula Campus – almost a quarter of the students currently are from overseas, primarily China, Hong Kong, and Malaysia. The university is very committed to providing support to these students who have additional challenges of language, culture, isolation from family, etc. over and above settling into university life. I will be taking part in information sessions about supports available for these students, and also joining them on a fun day outing to Healesville Sanctuary promoting getting to know each other as well as seeing some beautiful Australian scenery and animals.

Pancake breakfasts will be starting up again from Thursday 7th March, and we anticipate that it will be just as popular, and continue to provide an opportunity for students and staff to have a delicious breakfast and meet up and connect with each other, in what is often a busy and stressful week.

Please keep all the new and returning students in your thoughts and prayers as they transition back into study, and the staff as well as they organise and teach and mentor.



On a visit to someone terminally ill what can I say? Anxieties surface. No matter how strong our faith at times we are vulnerable. Sometimes we panic. Every scene is different according to those present.

One day I visited an old lady terminally ill at Apollo Bay Hospital. She lived at the foot of surrounding hills. "Please read me Psalm 121," she said. "Every day I lift up my eyes to those hills, also please make it part of my funeral service". Other possible helpful readings may be in Psalm 23, John 14 and 2 Corinthians 15, or a hymn or poem. Sometimes the gentle holding of a hand, or a touch of blessing on the forehead may be appropriate.

Principal Hector Maclean, of Ormond Theological Hall, told us this story. As a young minister he once visited a very sick old lady. He did not know what to say. So he left embarrassed, Next time he apologised to her for not saying anything. She replied, "If you had said anything I would have screamed!" Sometimes just being there is enough. Waiting for a word, or just being a peaceful presence.

Reflection:

Behold! I tell you a mystery. We shall not sleep, but we shall all be changed. In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet! (Read 1 Corinthians 15: 35–58.) THIS IS OUR FAITH!
