



THE SPIRIT MOVES AMONG US

One of the lines of our Vision Statement is "Strengthening Community through the Holy Spirit". Of course, there's a sense in which that statement is can be mis-read. It isn't like the Holy Spirit is ours to control, or that we can use the Holy Spirit for our purposes. We don't use the Spirit to achieve the goal of strengthening the community. Rather, our vision is to be sensitive to the movements of the Holy Spirit who seeks to build us up in community shaped around the love of Christ. As individuals, the Spirit works to bring God's transformative love into our hearts; but as we see in the book of Acts (and elsewhere) the Spirit has a strong outwards focus, moving us towards ministry and mission. The Spirit prompts and enables people to both work for and long for the growth and impact of the Christian community in its witness to Christ.

And so, we see how the Spirit prompts us into conversations and sharing in the context of the May Fete. We see how the Spirit draws us to offer blessing to each other through the combined worship with the Chinese congregation at Pentecost (June 12). We see how the Spirit calls us in and through various small groups around the church.

I've felt prompted recently to count up some of the small groups that meet around the church. There are quite a variety, including craft groups, a Wednesday night Bible study group, mission groups, dinner groups, a walking group, the Ladies Evening Group, Open and the "Back Corner Group", to name a few (and I'm sure I'll think of others as soon as I finish writing this). Some have a focus on spiritual growth, some on care for each other, some on fellowship and some meet around mutual interests.

As we head beyond Easter and (shortly) Pentecost, I'd like to look towards ways that we can be built up in faith and fellowship together, and some of that is through small groups. Have a think about what small groups you are involved with. Perhaps think, too, about whether the Spirit may be prompting you to join into a group which can further your own spiritual growth and engagement. It might be an already existing group, or you might like to talk with some of the church leadership about getting some new possibilities started.

Starting in July (after the school holidays) we will also start running some confirmation classes, looking towards confirmation (and in some cases baptism) early in the fourth school term, as personal statements of sharing in Christian faith. If you are interested or would like to know more about it, please talk with David or Hannah. We will have some more information about it in the next High Street Times.

THE NEWEST SAMARITANS

Finding myself drowning in years of trauma and of neglect, I lay on the side of the road, my soul bruised and broken; not knowing if I would survive. My unseen wounds open and exposed, who was I to turn too, would anyone help? Sensing what I thought was to be my last breath, I glanced into a pool of water just as dawn broke. Gazing into this life-giving source, I was surprised by the reflection I saw. With each hopelessly sustained breath the reflection became clearer. Life had bought myself to this horizontal abyss, if only to show the distance I had travelled alone despite injustice. I bore witness to how far I had come in my own journey. This vision became a faith-filled reminder of just how close I was to home despite all agony and ecstasy. Within this fever I had been made privy to heaven on earth, an ageless wisdom was summoning my courage to find the reason to survive. Answers became clearer; survival was dependant on becoming my own good Samaritan, my own hero. I thought of those that had sinned against me, I thought of those that loved me most supremely; drifting in and out of a light filled space where time became irrelevant. I was guided by those that had departed my earthly realm. They took me on a journey through my life. Visions of those I compassionately helped, though unaware, whispered their thanks. I saw mothers, I saw fathers, I saw sons and daughters; I witnessed so many that had lay in this very same space, unable to forgive those that had hurt them. My spirit was lifted beyond; gifting my heart with insight. These familiar echoes sang of change, they sang of life, their comforting echoes cried for all pain and suffering; they loved, they breathed. Many long gone came to bear witness to my pain and the pain of others. Their blinding light bled for the wounds of others; their tears cleansed the weary. Their faith was as strong and as hardy as any limb from a Bloodwood tree. As I woke from this vision I was sitting upright, my eyes where dry, my wounds healing; my cup was full. A note and gift was left in the palms of my hands it read. "For far too long have we neglected those by the side of the road, I have gifted you a bag of seeds. Sow their future with them. They all are giving trees. Just as you and all others that have lay here. All.





INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Early in the year I was invited to assist with the International Students orientation program, which included a morning information session about campus support services available to international students, a Frankston Bus Trip, and a day trip to Healesville Sanctuary. All these activities are designed to welcome the new students, provide information about life at Monash and in Frankston, Australia, and give opportunities to meet new friends and have fun. It was a beautiful day for the Frankston Bus Trip, which stopped at Oliver's Hill and the Frankston Lifesaving Club. It was a wonderful opportunity for me to make some great connections with students from overseas who represent 25% of our student population at Frankston, and who often have different support needs.

MEMORIAL SERVICES

The Monash University community, along with the wider community, were shocked and saddened by the tragic events in Christchurch in March, and in Sri Lanka in April. On both occasions, the university decided to hold a multi-faith memorial service, held in the large Religious Centre at Clayton campus. Our group of chaplains from different faiths came together to plan and lead the services, which were extremely well attended and clearly met a need for students and staff to come together, share their grief and pay their respects. HUMAN BOOK LIBRARY

I participated for a second year in the "Human Book Library". "What on earth is that?", you ask! Imagine a large room with 20 "human books" each seated at different tables - 20 ordinary people with different extraordinary stories to tell about a diverse range of personal experiences - coping with mental health issues, being a carer, being a refugee, being Muslim in Australia, being involved in defence forces and going to war, and so many more. Then, imagine 120 Occupational Therapy students selecting a "book" they are interested in, spreading themselves around the "books" throughout the room, spending twenty minute blocks listening to and interacting with them, and then swapping around to find a different book. It's an amazing opportunity for students to engage with people and their stories, a fantastic learning experience, and great preparation for going out on placements in the community. Jenni Forbes and Ann Forbes joined me as "books" this year, and last year Arthur Poole and Trent Kennedy also shared their stories - all extremely well received.



Of course, I always need to mention pancakes! Because it's such a great way of students and staff and myself engaging and connecting with each other, through providing a simple yummy breakfast and a warm and friendly space to interact. We regularly have between 150-200 people each Thursday morning, and I am consistently told how much people appreciate it and how much it means to them. Thanks to our wonderful volunteers, Alan and Gill, Peggy, and Max and Jenny who have offered fantastic support this semester J. The colourful pancakes pictured were to help celebrate a special day in support of people with diverse backgrounds and sexuality, who also often have additional support needs at university.

Apart from these kind of activities, the regular one-to-one interaction with students and staff also continues, in various ways (both formal and informal, and about a variety of issues). Please keep students and staff at the university in your thoughts and prayers, as they head into their last week of classes, and a study week, and then a three-week exam period to complete Semester 1.

On the afternoon of Saturday 15 June, we will be uplifted to the glorious strains of the historic 106 year old Aeolian organ, which once graced the Manyung mansion, being played after its recent restoration.

The program will include some exquisite organ gems from the classical and romantic repertoire, as well as some well-known hymns for those who care to exercise their own vocal chords.

We are excited to have secured the services of a world-class young organist, Lachlan Redd, who grew up and was educated in Mt Eliza on the Mornington Peninsula.

Lachlan, graduated from the Manhattan School of Music in New York, with a Masters degree in piano performance. He was a scholarship holder and recipient of the Queen's Trust for Young Australians. He completed his Bachelor of Music Degree with First Class Honours and was awarded the University medal from the Australian National University. In 1995 Lachlan won First Prize in the Fourth International Youth Music Festival "Virtuosi of the year 2000" in St Petersburg. He was a finalist in the inaugural ABC TV Quest Competition (1995) and the following year won the national Keyboard Finals of the ABC Young Performer of the Year Awards. He has appeared as a recitalist and concerto artist for the ABC on simulcasts on ABC TV and Classic FM and as a soloist with the Melbourne, Adelaide, Tasmanian and Queensland Philharmonic and Symphony orchestras. In 2004 Lachlan was appointed Assistant Organist at St Paul's Cathedral in Melbourne and was appointed Sub-Organist in that church in 2014.
