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St Francis

Today's contemporary service includes a 'Blessing of the Animals'. The 'feast of St Francis' was a little earlier this month (October 4); here are some introductory comments from Hannah about the life of St Francis to inspire us:

St Francis was born in the 12 century in the land we now call Italy. He began life as a wealthy man, travelling through many countries enjoying his comfortable upbringing. In his travels, he met many poor people and one encounter with a leper changed his heart. He gave up his money and dedicated his life to God, wandering the roads dressed as a beggar himself. Soon Francis and his friends began to live and pray together, often travelling around to tell the stories of Jesus wherever they went. They were committed to following the teachings of Jesus and walking in his footsteps.

Francis believed we should pay attention to everything God made, not just people who need help but every single thing around us. He thought that the spirit of life within each creature calls to that same spirit of life in all other creatures. That's why we feel sorry for animals when they're young or hurt and need help. And we feel for plants dying, we are even connected with the ground we walk on and the stars in the sky when we are out in nature, because we know God cares for every precious little detail in the

world. God's calls for the reconciliation of the whole of creation!

The legend of St Francis tells us that birds and animals would come to him when he was out walking, even when he was preaching to people! Birds would sit on his shoulder, listen to him, sing for him – and for God. And so whenever we remember St Francis, we remember him as the patron Saint of animals and the environment – and also remember that every kind of creature – from the birds and wild animals to the rocks and stars – has its own way to praise God.
