As Voices of Frankston approaches its 5th year, birthday celebrations are in the wind. We would like to invite you to come and celebrate with us on October 16th at 10am for morning tea followed by our free Birthday Concert at 10.30am at High St Uniting Church Frankston.

Over the past years Voices of Frankston Choir has grown from strength to strength. In the beginning we were under the guidance of The School of Hard Knocks and shared many exciting times singing in the Melbourne Town Hall and Deakin Edge Theatre.

From the start of this year we have established ourselves as an independent, incorporated, not for profit charitable organisation, under the leadership of the extremely talented and dedicated Kerry Gerraty. Kerry has the wonderful ability to fill everyone with confidence and bring out the best in us all through the joy of singing. We have a regular core of membership of 35 choristers, a wonderful group of people from the local community who support each other through our music and beyond.

We still meet every Wednesday morning at the Frankston High Street Uniting Church and provide our choristers with a welcoming place to come and sing , be accepted and have the opportunity to perform and bring joy to others. The support we have from the Church has been a major contribution in the continuation of our choir. Our volunteers provide morning tea and lunch and a chance for the choristers to chat and have social interaction within the group.

This year we started with a performance as the backing choir for the opening and closing ceremonies for the Rotary 2019 Multi District Conference held at the Melbourne Entertainment and Convention Centre. What a delight that was! Other performances during the past 12 months include joint concerts with the Australian Welsh Male Choir, Frankston High School, Frankston Heights Primary School, at the Frankston RSL "Thank you to our Volunteers" dinner, Langwarrin Community Centre, Vision Australia, MP Choral Festival Peninsula Community Theatre and a "Thank you" performance at the Church. Along with the funds provided by these venues we have had several fund raising events, substantial donations from Blue Scope Steel, Up Beat Arts, Progress Signs and Bing Boys, an ongoing GoFundMe on social media, annual membership fee of \$1 and regular weekly subscriptions of \$5 from those who can afford it.

On Sunday September 22nd, the contemporary service shifted to a 5pm timeslot and our new Presbytery Minister for Church Development, Craig Mitchell, helped our young people lead a worship service based on Genesis 18, where we explored a story of three messengers who stopped by Abraham and Sarah's tent, seeking hospitality and bringing a word of hope.

We sat together in three tribes under a starry sky, sang songs around 'campfires', and were served Middle Eastern food while we heard three story tellers retell the bible reading in different ways. We wondered together about how this relates to our own stories and shared prayers for those around us, beyond us, and for ourselves as we considered what is it that we hoped for?

My hope is that it was a meaningful, experiential learning space for people to engage the senses and encounter God – perhaps in the stars, perhaps in the stranger, perhaps in the people around them or those who stop by for dinner!

CHURCH COUNCIL NEWS:

Over recent months, Church Council has been overseeing a number of important elements of our High Street UC operations, as well as reflecting carefully upon some key documents and initiatives of the Victorian Synod. We are most conscious that all we do and focus upon is intended to both support all we undertake as a congregation, as well as proactively supporting our wider mission within the Frankston community. At our most recent meeting, on 20 August, it was recognised that we needed to convey some important aspects of our work on your behalf to you at this time. This report is intended to clarify some of these actions and plans.

Grant request

Our funding for the Youth Coordinator position, currently filled so capably and enthusiastically by Hannah Dungan, is only current until the end of this year. Accordingly, we have developed and lodged an application for a continuation of funding for this role, for a further 3 years. In support of this, Mandy Lake and Mike Guest, briefly addressed a recent meeting of Presbytery. We hope that the outcome of this application will be positive, given that our own budget cannot sustain such an outlay at present. We will advise you when the decision has been transmitted by Synod.

Provision of a Defibrillator

Over a number of meetings of Church Council, the issue of the provision of a defibrillator within the High Street complex, was necessary. After some investigations, it was determined that, unlike schools and sporting organisations, we could not readily access a great to pay the \$2,000 or so this would require. We resolved that we needed to act upon this essential first aid item and undertake a special congregational appeal, together with funding from the Ladies' Evening Group (if necessary). It is hoped that this can be finalised soon, and located adjacent to the Office in a safe, secure and accessible place.

Synod Disability Action Plan

In alignment with society at large, and in acknowledgement of our own faith as Christians, a Disability Action Plan (2019-2022) has been developed and recently forwarded to Church Councils and leaders. It is intended to assist churches to become more open to the inclusion of all people as beloved ones of God. As both the outgoing Moderator, Rev Sharon Hollis and the newly-elected Moderator, Rev Denise Liersch have written, we need to "move from desiring to be communities of hospitality to being communities that have concrete actions and plans to embed our hope in the way we worship, the policies we have, the layout of our buildings, the language we use, and so much more." Accordingly, Jackie Annable and I will meet to explore the best ways for our congregation to act to enact and embrace this new Plan. You may anticipate hearing more about this in coming months.

Synod Resolution: 'Statement from the Heart'

At the most recent Synod meeting, in July this year, one major matter for consideration was the Uniting Church's support for the 2017 Statement from the Heart, made at Uluru. As a congregation we have accordingly been asked to prayerfully consider and discuss this statement and its implications for our local area. We have been asked to support moves to have the establishment of a First Nation's Voice

enshrined in our Constitution, which is not currently the case, as well as a Makarrata Commission to oversee agreement between governments and First Nations. Ultimately, this is aims to facilitate three elements: Truth, Treaty and Voice. Church Council will explore the possibility of facilitating a discussion evening, with local representatives of the Boon Wurrung/ Bunurong people, Frankston Council representatives and possibly Mark Zirnsak from Synod to consider how we can better embrace and include our First Peoples.

Synod Resolution: Greater inclusion of adults under 50

Another Synod resolution related to ways in which congregations may better include adults under 50 years of age, especially in key leadership groups and decisions. This matter will continue to be prayerfully reflected upon by Church Council and ways to encourage the more active participation of younger people in the life of our congregation explored. Some areas for consideration include increased use of technology and changes to meeting organisation and timing. Clearly, for the viability of our church, we need to be continually exploring ways in which to pass on leadership to younger generations.

More Organ challenges!

Over a number of Sundays in August, members of the traditional service, would have been aware that the organ was not used whatsoever. This was occasioned by the discovery of a hole in the leather work which transmits air from the swell windchest to the organ pipes. Normally, such leather work should be replaced every 50 years; ours has not been replaced in some 103 years! It has been temporarily patched. We are seeking a firm quotation from our organ experts, Australian Pipe Organs, but have been advised that this may be in the vicinity of some \$16,000-no small sum! It may be that we need another organ repair fund, as custodians of our unique 1914 Aeolian pipe organ, so it can again

envelop our church in its dulcet and stirring strains as it should.

Christmas Fair: Saturday 7 December:

10am-2pm

Our traditional November Food Fair can no longer be sustained, as it is no longer viable and so it has been decided to hold in its stead a Christmas Fair. We are optimistic that such an event should appeal to the wider community, as well as being well within our means to organise. Therefore, this would serve both to provide another means of outreach into the local community, as well as generating income for the running and work of our church. Marg Scarlett has kindly offered to lead the organising group. Do note the date in your diary now and consider Christmas items you may be able to contribute! Ross Huggard, Chairperson



Changing the life of a **young** person

DNE future at a time

Dear Church Community,

I am writing to inform you of exciting VOLUNTEERING OPPORTUNITIES that have arisen within our organisation, SHINE for Kids, in the FRANKSTON area. These positions will suit applicants within your community who may be studying, or have an interest in, criminology, education, psychology, child-related courses or community work.

SHINE for Kids, and specifically the RISE Education Program, has been successfully implemented in several areas throughout Australia for a number of years. The RISE Education Program is now being rolled out into Primary Schools in the Frankston municipality thanks to the funding support of Anglicare Victoria.

SHINE for Kids is the only national charity in Australia that works solely to support the children and families of people involved in the criminal justice system. SHINE for Kids provides services to support children and young people from infancy through to adulthood.

WHAT IS THE RISE EDUCATION PROGRAM (FRANKSTON)?

The RISE Education Program provides students with an incarcerated parent, a dedicated mentor who will provide them with support in the classroom for a minimum 12 month period. This may be in the classroom with class work, building their confidence in social environments, or in the playground playing ball and talking about whatever is on their mind that day. The program aims to increase school attendance, educational outcomes, self-esteem and decrease antisocial behaviour and school suspensions.

RISE Education Mentors are responsible for providing one on one mentoring in the classroom weekly for one hour to a student with a parent in prison. By providing the student with a positive role model and someone to advocate for them within **the school environment you are ensuring they don't just survive a difficult time in their life but that they thrive.**

WHAT WE ARE LOOKING FOR IN A VOLUNTEER:

Lives within or near Frankston City

Previous mentoring experience with young people is desirable but not essential

Demonstrated high level verbal and written communication skills

Excellent time management skills

Attention to detail and a hands on approach

An understanding of the issues and challenges that young people face

🛛 Willingness to learn about the issues and challenges that children of prisoners face

Willingness to learn about the needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and Culturally and Linguistically diverse young people and families

Willingness to learn about current Child Protection legislative requirements

□ The capacity to work professionally with appropriate boundaries (personal and professional) in an independent role □ Commitment to a long term mentoring relationship (minimum 12 months, 1 hour per week)

Little penguin rehabilitation jumpers needed!

PENGUIN REHABILITATION Jumper Pattern

BACK:

Cast on 36 sts.

KI Pl to the end of the row.
Repeat for 7 more rows.
Change to K2 P2 and inc. 8 sts. evenly

across this row. (44sts.)

•Continue until the work measures 12cm.

•Dec. 1 st. each end of every row till 28 sts.

•Dec. one stitch in the middle of the next row. (27 sts)

•Change to KIPl rib for 10 rows. Cast off.

FRONT:

•Knit same as the Back.

•Using a flat seam join the neck edges together (about 4cm)


•Stitch the sides to the beginning of the upper decreasing (opening for each flipper).

Side seam should be 12cm approximately.

Flipper opening about 4cm in length.

WHILE ADORABLE, THESE PENGUIN JUMPERS ARE NOT A FASHION STATEMENT!

8 ply Pattern Directions given Australia (U.K., USA) You will need: 8 ply (D.K., Sport/Worsted) yarn 1 pr 3.75mm (no.9, US no.5)



Total length of finished jumper should be no more than 18cm, width should be no more than 12cm, base width should be no more than 11cm.

A Letter Of Love Dedicated To Broken Hearts On The Mend

Finding strength in the face of adversity can be one of the toughest trials giving souls may ever have to endure. I speak from a place of truth testifying that personal childhood trauma, mental, physical and sexual abuse set my life's journey on pathways towards addictions, lack of self-worth, depression and post-traumatic stress. My ongoing recovery has blessed me with an awareness. With this at the forefront of my spiritual consciousness, may I with your permission share and authenticate my life story so far; utilizing my experiences as a platform to validate those for whom have, and perhaps are currently experiencing their own personal turmoil. In addition may I share personal strategies as a guide to help those recovering and those that support the broken hearted.

Time is a gift that mostly goes unrecognized -

its healing potential is phenomenal. Understanding time, taking time, and managing time, seems to be one of the hardest things to comprehend let alone put into practice when in the depths of despair. Recognition that time is your friend is a marvelled stepping-stone. I found by surrendering myself to time; conscious and authentic healing began to reveal methods that I could implement to redirect my focus and find the healing properties needed to manifest positive change in my life. When I found the opportunity however big or small, I would set aside a minute, an hour, or if a whole day could be facilitated, I would utilize this time to be with myself, just as you yourself can do. I cannot recommend enough the importance of being earnest in this endeavour; loving and being kind to yourself is crucial in the narrative of personal healing. I find being present among nature, (long walks can be wonderous) listening to life and all the sounds that create this living symphony and healing auditory tonic was astounding. I highly recommend immersing yourself amongst flora and fauna; this wonderment and oneness with mother earth helped to centre my soul, an indeed may help your own light also. Spend time doing what it is that truly makes you happy. Write, journal, paint, draw, cook, be boundless; let your constructive imagination guide your light.

Engaging in compassionate acts of kindness can be so personally fulfilling.

I find when engaging with community my spirits are lifted above my pain and trauma. By validating others I found much needed validation for myself; such a crucial component in recovery and healing. The magic of social and civil engagement inclusive of service to others in need of support enriches my life. I highly recommend acts of compassion, they provide an opportunity to view and also support the lives of those which your beautiful intent has captured and supported, which then delivers clarity on your humble intentions of love. We become a living examples of the change we want to be and the change we need to see. Our deeds become teachable moments. How do you wish to be, and see the world? My healing was enriched and a sense of clarity begans to shift the clouds from my heart and mind; becoming the rainbow in not only my sky but of another's sky also. Slowly I came to understand that it is possible to shine once more.

Seeking counsel is an absolute necessity and one of the most courageous acts of self-love.

Bravery is found in the willingness to accept that sometimes we cannot do it alone and nor should we have too. My strength and personal foundations have become fortified in the knowledge that by being present, taking control of my life and its divine purpose, reflects the intent of my unique valour. Accepting that others similar consciousness's could supplement and assist in navigating my way through the pain was truly heaven sent. Sheep need a Shepherd just as Shepherd's need sheep. We all have purpose, we all have a calling, we all have lessons to learn and lessons to teach.

PS. My intent is to provide small insights on healing after trauma and grief. This letter of love, hope and faith will be continued over the next few months.
