The Back Page

TRADITIONS ANCIENT AND MODERN

Today is the first of the four Sundays of Advent, the time leading up to Christmas. The Bible reading set down for today comes from the time of King Josiah, a young king in Israel a few hundred years before Christ.

Early in Josiah's time, some workers in the temple "rediscovered" the books of the law. This was a monumental find. Prior to Josiah there had been some kings who had put themselves above the law, and who get very poor commentary in the Biblical record. In Josiah's time, the law is rediscovered, and with it a reminder that even kings are not above the law, we are all a part of a broader society and have ethical responsibilities together. The people of that time re-establish their covenant relationship with God as a society together.

Today we are also celebrating the baptisms of Alexander and Louis Wittick. In a similar way, this is also about recognising that we are born into a bigger picture. The church family continues to promise to live with love, compassion, and care for justice, following the pattern and promise of Jesus' own life.
