



FROM THE MINISTER

I'm writing this having just returned from a wonderful church camp at Merricks. We enjoyed a beautifully relaxed time, canoeing, walking on the beach, and creating some new artwork which will soon hang in the hall. On Sunday morning about 45 of us participated in worship on the theme of "The Clory of Cod is a Human Being Fully Alive". Many thanks to Jackie Annable and all those who contributed to our wonderful time away. There's been a tentative booking made for next year already.

The Christmas Fair is coming soon, with Christmas just around the corner. We are trying a different format from the Food Fair, moving to a Saturday morning, with Christmas themes fancy goods, gifts and cards, and some great entertainment. The Fair will be open from 10am to 2pm on Saturday 7 December, and is a chance for us to "strengthen community", praying for the Holy Spirit's presence among us.

Over the course of Advent, our Sunday morning Bible readings take us on a journey of rediscovering old stories (through the story of Josiah), and preparing space in our lives to hear the call of Cod (Isaiah and Ezra). The latter reading sets up the temple space, in which many years later Zechariah has a divine encounter which marks the beginning of the new movement of Cod towards us in Christ. During December will also be celebrating some baptisms, which is a wonderful way of celebrating the new life Cod brings.

The Christmas services start with a Family Christmas Celebration at 5:00 on Christmas Eve, will include a dramatic telling of the Nativity story; all are very welcome, and a sausage sizzle will follow. There will also be a "Midnight Carols" service at 11:30 on Christmas Eve, and Christmas Day Worship at 9:00.

While I was on study leave recently I attended a two-day workshop on inter-cultural ministry. As I was describing ministry in Frankston to a colleague there, he pointed out that the two services we usually have – Traditional and Contemporary – represent different cultures in themselves. When we have "combined" worship in the Sundays after Christmas until the end of January, we are doing something "inter-cultural", which draws each of our out of our comfort zones, to perhaps learn to

appreciate the gifts and critiques that the "other" offers. To capitalise on this, I plan for us to feature some of the various cultural backgrounds that our members bring on those Sundays, to raise our understanding of those different cultural backgrounds. Those combined services will be at 10:00am.

At the end of the year, Arthur Poole is going to relinquish the Pastoral Care role that he has been doing so well. Fortunately, we are blessed to be able to welcome Brenda Cooper back into the role, which we'll celebrate at a service in early January. Blessings abound. I will be around right through the December January period, apart from one week in January (11th - 17th).

Advent is a time of waiting

A year ago, a friend moved into a new house. Much work needed to be done to renovate the house and the garden. He initially had plans to have it well under way within the first year. Things have moved slower than my friend expected. And he learned this has been a good thing. It's given him time to listen to the rhythm of the seasons in this new place where the weather patterns and growing conditions were very different to what he had been used to; to listen to the wisdom of others regarding what plants would grow best; to observe the local birds and see what they need.

After this time of listening, he has made the difficult decision to cut down several native trees in his garden. Difficult because he's observed the birds love them. Difficult because he finds them beautiful and the light filters through the leaves in a way that he finds delightful. But they are not indigenous to the area and others like them have become pests in local bushland only a short distance from his new house (the birds love the seeds too much and help spread the trees widely!).

There is a real cost for my friend in being a good bushland neighbour financially, aesthetically, and through the loss of the birds he's enjoyed while more appropriate plants recover the space. But as I think of his story, I am reminded of a slogan that was popular over 20 years ago: "Think globally, act locally".

My friend is not involved in putting up wind farms or solar energy farms; he does not speak on the global stage. But the changes he is making in his garden will have an impact on the local native bushland close to his house. He is helping to reduce the pressure on it to survive as committed local people work to rehabilitate it back close to its original form. Every action, however small, each of us takes to be more mindful of our environment, and our choices within it, makes a difference.

So, what does this have to do with Advent? In Advent we are called to a time of waiting and watching. Sometimes, it takes time to hear and know how God is calling us to act. We are called to wait and watch and listen carefully. God, through Christ, seeks the renewing of all creation (Col 1:20), not just the human creatures! God calls us into partnership to work towards that renewal now and into the future.

Perhaps with God, we are called to "Think cosmically, act locally." Written by Mel Perkins

I want to thank all office bearers and volunteers that have again been enthusiastic and willing workers. Enabling us to supply an even greater number of items to the Community Support Frankston, 24,044 and counting.

We are also partnering CSF in providing 350 Christmas Hampers this December.

Daryl Groves has joined our happy band of delivery boys. Welcome!!


We were saddened by the passing of Florence McGuinness and our thoughts and prayers go out to Pat.


Again CSF has acknowledged Larders contribution in their Annual Report.

The Food Bank Hunger Report for 2019 reports more than 1 in 5 Australians experienced food insecurity in the past 12 months. At least once a week 3 in 10 Food Insecure Australians go a whole day without eating and children represent 22% increase in the number of individuals seeking food relief from charities. Only 37% of charities are meeting the full needs of the people they assist. Despite Australia's reputation as a wealthy country food insecurity is a reality for an increasing number of people.


From Church Council

CHAPLAINCY AT MONASH UNIVERSITY

What has the Chaplain been doing at Monash University this semester? Here are some stories which will hopefully give you a picture of the range of work I've been involved with!

One-to-one interactions I've been privileged to be trusted with some discussions with students who are having difficulties with a range of issues in their lives. For example, a masters student who is exploring Christianity following the death of her nephew: a mature age student with children who is working through possible separation with her husband, a young man working through issues of conflict between his parents at home; and a highly educated young man who is the partner of a PHD student from Iran who is having difficulties finding work due to his English skills. I'm in a fortunate position to be able to provide a listening ear, and walk alongside people in a way that isn't often done by others in the university environment.

Pancake breakfasts

Pancake breakfasts continue to be a great way for me to get to know students and staff, and provide a warm and friendly space for people to connect and interact. Thank you to the dream team — Alan, Gill, Peggy, Jen, Howard and Max — for all your hard work in making all this happen! What I've really noticed, especially in this last semester, is bringing people together across courses. A story which illustrates this and that I'm especially happy about is the bringing together of two of the students whom I had spoken with individually. They could not be more different! One a mature age woman from Australia with five children with a history of family violence, studying paramedics, and the other a young man of overseas background with questions about faith and sexuality, studying education. These two were introduced to each other one morning at the breakfast, and now seeking each other out to sit and chat while they eat, developing a friendship, and supporting each other in their studies.

Involvement in theme weeks

I was again involved in "Diversity and inclusion Week" in October, celebrated across the whole university with different events and activities focussed on diversity and inclusion issues. Along with other chaplains, we ran a "Wheel of Diversity" event over funchtime at each campus, where students would spin the wheel, answer a trivia question in different categories (mental health, religion, gender, cultural background, indigenous issues, disability, etc.), answer the question correctly (sometimes with a lot of light-hearted support and encouragement from us), and win a free coffee voucher. This is the third year we have done this, and it's proved to be a great fun way of chaplains engaging with students, in addition to promoting the underlying themes of the week.

Professional Development

I attended a three day conference on the Gold Coast for chaplains at universities, and it was a really positive time of great networking, learning lots of new thing, sharing ideas, and being both challenged and affirmed in my work. I also attended a three day training on "Uniting Church in Australia" run by the Centre for Theology and Ministry (for all candidates for ministry, postors, and ministers transferring into the Uniting Church from other faith backgrounds). We were privileged to have some of the amazing people in leadership positions in our Synod come and speak to us about different aspects of the Uniting Church's life and work, and especially the theology underpinning it all, and I found it really beneficial and inspiring.

Thanks to you all for the support of Chaplaincy through this church, and please keep students in your prayers as they have a break from study over summer, wait for exam results, continue part-time work to support themselves, and for final year students as they transition from university life to the workforce in their chosen field.











Our light globes have just been changed. Again. It seems only recently that the old incandescent ones were swapped for compact fluorescents. Now they, too, are old hat ('Oh, they contain mercury, you know!') and have in turn been updated to LEDs. But as for candles, now there's a different matter. There's something about candlelight. Its softness, warmth and vulnerability. Birthday candles are celebratory. Dinner candles are romantic. Memorial candles are solemn. Prayer candles are humble.

Christmas candles are joyful. Sparkling candles are exciting. Candles are just wonderful. Each little flicker seems so frail and fleeting: it's no wonder they are symbolic of life, to be savoured and enjoyed while it lasts. In Luke we are told not to hide our light under a bushel (an archaic term for 'a bowl'); rather to do as Susan Warner's hymn implores, to "shine ... like a little candle, burning in the night". There's a genuineness in candlelight that no LED artificiality can replicate, a calling to a life of warmth and light and simplicity

Reflection:

If therefore your whole body is full of light, having no part dark, it will be wholly full of light, as when the lamp with its bright shining gives you light.

JBKS Project Report North India Tour 2019









SEVEN women, including a 16 year old girl, and one brave man ventured to North India once again recently in support of the JBKS Community Health project in the Punjab. It was a pilgrimage we would never forget.

The purpose of the mission was to learn and share with the Jagriti Bhalai Kendra Society (JBKS) project team and the communities who are supported by this remarkable program. Since the early days of our support, seven years ago, the program has developed from maternal and child work into a much broader, stronger and more self-sustaining set up.

In addition to the health, hygiene and natal care elements, the tour guests were able to witness and immerse themselves in: The widows and single women programs promoting unity, female empowerment, gender equality and social enterprise; support for HIV children and teenagers born with the virus; nutritional health work with a Punjabi version of Masterchef; a climate change and environmental awareness poster competition and, finally, engagement with orphaned girls being housed and educated in a local school hostel.







Dr Alma Ram, who runs the project in the Punjab, took us through the various elements of the program, and the immense cultural and logistical obstacles they face, on day one in the head office. We presented her with a beautiful stitched quilt from women at Berwick

Uniting church. As well as the grinding daily problems, Alma happily shared the great strides of progress. We learned that the defence of the girl child program has led to approximately 6,000 more baby girls being born or surviving since the project began. After six tours these people are like family now - with some people attending Alma's daughter's wedding last year - and each new guest has a unique experience and shares in a journey of togetherness.

Following the four days visiting the project in and around Amritsar, the group movd on and also enjoyed sight-seeing and cultural visits to Dharamsala (the Dalai Lama was out of town), Rishikesh, Agra and New Delhi. It really was an incredible journey once more. Alan and Bronwen Mathews came on the tour, many of these photos were taken by him, along with Ruth Hough, Mt Martha UC. Barbara Chamberlain. Help to save our 105 year old historic AEOLIAN PIPE ORGAN!

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM?

We all appreciate that as we age, parts of our body wear out and don't function as well as they used to, don't we?

Our pipe organ has a newly diagnosed chronic serious 'breathing problem'! The 'windchest' of our pipe organ, which is made of leather and supplies the critically-important wind to the pipes, has quite simply worn out and is about to completely disintegrate. This will make the organ inoperable.

Typically, such leather-work should have only lasted around 50 years, but in our case, we have had another 55 years of dutiful service! However, the time has come for this to be replaced and repaired.

HOW MUCH WILL THIS COST?

Our organ is one of only several still in existence and able to be played in Australia, and is a listed historic organ. If you attended one of the special organ recitals by Lachlan Redd, you will know first-hand the force, calibre and wonderful tonality of this organ. As such, there are very few skilled tradespeople able to maintain and repair it. Australian Pipe Organs is the only recommended repairer for our type of pipe organ. Due to the complexity of the repairs, and around four weeks of work required on it, the cost will be \$24,600, which is a significant sum of money.

Why doesn't Church Council authorise payment for these repairs?

We prioritise the use of the church finances to provide for the ministry and mission needs of this community, in line with our vision statement, and to cover the property maintenance requirements, which include the looming need to replace the hall roof and external hall windows. These are important repair tasks, which we cannot ignore. Therefore, Church Council has determined that we cannot allocate our scarce funds to repair our pipe organ, even though we recognise the importance of the organ and value it. Just like you.

WHAT NOW?

Church Council is therefore launching a seperate special fund SAVE OUR AEOLIAN ORGAN APPEAL.

We know there are many demands on our funds, but hope that many of you will recognise that we are custodians of this wonderful organ and accordingly have a duty to ensure it will continue to be played for generations to come.

Several people have already indicated that they will make a significant donation to this separate, special organ restoration fund. We would ask you to carefully reflect upon this matter and hopefully feel moved to donate.
