Dear friends in Christ,

This is exactly what the season of Advent is all about: feeling like we are on the cusp; like things are about to change; like something new is about to begin; like something (or someone?) is coming...

As I write this column, so many things are on the cusp – and by the time you read this, some of them will have started to flow. The Church Council is meeting to talk about when we can start using the facilities for all of the various activities that have been limited to date. The applications for a Children and Youth worker, and for a Somers Camp Chaplain, are both soon going to close. Advertising for a new Office Administrator will soon commence. The Joint Nominating Committee will soon be surveying the congregation about the vision and mission that God gives to us for this community. And in the midst of this, we have a strong hope of all coming together to celebrate the birth of the one whose life, death, and resurrection reshaped all the world, and in whose leadership and love our own lives are transformed.

In the midst of this season of being on the cusp, then, please take moments and time to pray. For this Advent, can I suggest:

- Use a calendar to write the name of one person or situation for each day between the start of Advent and Christmas as a focus for prayer
- In each week of Advent, take some time to read the following passages, perhaps a portion of each passage each day. They are focused on themes like waiting, praying, and praise. What words and phrases strike you as you read? What might God be saying to you in that?

WEEK ONE: (Starting 28 November) Psalm 25 WEEK TWO: (Starting 5 December) Luke 1 WEEK THREE: (Starting 12 December) Isaiah 12 WEEK FOUR: (Starting 19 December) Psalm 80 CHRISTMAS EVE: Psalm 96

On Christmas Eve I hope that many of us can come together for a BBQ and Carol Singing, at the Church (outside if possible!). The BBQ will be served from 6pm, and the Carol Singing starts at 7:00. I hope to see many of you then!

ACT 2

The Uniting Church Assembly has been consulting and working to consider afresh the ordering of the life of the church. Much has changed in both the church and wider Australian society since the Uniting Church was formed 44 years ago. The ACT 2 consultations have been an opportunity to explore what changes might be helpful to live out our common commitment to the Church's mission and to demonstrate our unity as People of God.

A report titled "ACT2: Considering afresh our life together" has been produced and is available to see at <u>https://uniting.church/act2/</u>. It reports three main themes that have arisen from the consultations, with three key issues to address:

- Towards a more equitably resourced and sustainable church
- Towards a simpler, more streamlined model of ordering our life
- Towards a cohesive national character and vision

Further feedback is being sought about the approaches suggested to these issues. Please consider looking up this report, and completing a survey in response. Some copies of the report will be made available in the church foyer.

JNC NEWS

No doubt you will be pleased to learn that the JNC (Joint Nominating Committee) has very recently held its first full meeting at which the steps and processes which need to be followed were clearly explained by its Chairperson, Rev Joy Blamires (Mornington UC Minister). As a key part of this process, as a congregation, we need to discern our mission priorities, based around the relevant Synod Placement Profile form. As a result, it is planned to Email you a copy of a survey we will be conducting between the services at a short special Congregational Meeting on Sunday 5 December beforehand. It is hoped that Elders will be able to assist in accessing completed surveys from those unable to attend church in person on that Sunday. All of this needs to be done at this time to ensure that we can finalise the full Placement Profile in readiness for Church Council approval and subsequent forwarding to both Presbytery (PRC) and Synod (Placements Committee) at their first meetings in 2022. *- Ross Huggard (on behalf of the JNC)*

CALLING ALL KNITTERS

In June this year Mission Guild had a speaker from the outreach program operating out of Broadmeadows. We were able to send them home with a car full of knitted blankets, baby cot blankets, scarves and beanies. The social worker, who was our speaker, told us of the needs of the folk they work with.



This winter the calls for help have exhausted all their

supplies and our load of warm things was an answer to their prayers. Next winter will probably be the same.

I thought we here at High Street could make an effort to build their recourses before next winter comes.

I am wondering if you could knit squares or long strips equivalent to five squares. I will sew your knitting together whatever you choose to do.

Best yarn to use is 100% acrylic 8 ply (it is easy to launder) 50 stitches on 4mm needles. Talking of knitters, Larder has a former member of St. Andrews who knits jumpers for us to distribute through Community Support Frankston.

At the last count Jean McPherson has knitted 1,238 Jumpers for Larder since 2012 . If any of the non-knitters would like to help by supplying balls of yarn 100% acrylic, 8 ply they would be greatly appreciated.

KAY AND MURRAY'S WELCOME TO QUEENSLAND.

We have been asked to provide an insight into hotel quarantine in Queensland. So here goes. After waiting for two months for a border pass into Queensland our flight landed at Brisbane Airport at 5:20 pm on October 27th. All of the passengers were escorted across the tarmac, under the watchful eye of police, into a long room lined on one side with tables at which police officers were sitting, with more police standing around watching.

After standing in a queue for at least 30 minutes, we had our turn to present our paperwork to a police officer at one of the tables, only to be told that we had the wrong border pass, and we thought for a while that we would be sent right back to Melbourne.

After a very tense 15-20 minutes waiting for our application to be checked, we were finally told it was OK. They must have worked out that it was actually their fault, not ours, as it was Queensland Police who processed our application and provided the border pass. We were then escorted to a roped off area of well-spaced chairs and told to sit and wait. Once all the passengers had been processed, we were escorted through to the baggage collection area, still surrounded by police.

Then when we all had our bags we were led outside to be divided among several buses, still surrounded by police. We all had to load our own bags into the luggage compartment of the bus, as no-one else was allowed to touch them. At this stage we still had no idea which hotel we were going to.

After about a 20min drive we arrived at the Pacific Hotel, fairly close to the centre of Brisbane. We were kept on the bus while each person or couple was processed individually. When it was our turn, and after collecting our bags, changing our masks, and using hand sanitizer twice, we were allowed into the hotel foyer.

There we were registered, given a room key, and a "welcome" snack bag as well as our breakfast boxes for the next morning, and then escorted to a lift. We entered the lift with our bags but were not allowed to touch the buttons, which were then pressed by a police officer. At this point I must say that the police officer was kind enough to offer to help us with our bags when we reached our floor (which I don't think he was supposed to do, but we did have a lot of luggage). He did not however, get into the lift with us but took a separate one. We finally arrived in our room at approximately 8:30pm. On enquiring about dinner, we were told that we could order in if we wished, as the hotel would not be providing a meal.

I will say that we do understand the reasons behind their caution, however, that doesn't prevent us from feeling a bit like a cross between convicts and lepers.

Once in our room we investigated our snack bags to find we each had a 50g bag of potato crisps, and one of the bags had a chocolate muffin, but not the other, so that was our dinner. We were too exhausted to think about ordering in.

Hotel quarantine is at our expense entirely, including a flat rate of \$65 per person per day for food...... whether we eat it or not. Again, we can order in if we want, but that would also be at our expense and would not alter the \$65 flat rate.

Our room is quite nice; modern and clean; but it is a typical hotel room, designed for short stays, not for living in 24 hours a day. We have a small balcony, which is a blessing, and the view is lovely; overlooking a pretty park. We have a small 'fridge, a kettle, two mugs, two water glasses, two wine glasses, two teaspoons and a supply of tea, coffee and sugar sachets. There is no toaster. We also have only one chair for sitting at the desk to eat our meals, one lounge chair, which is too low to sit at the desk, and one plastic chair on the balcony, which I bring inside to use for meals.

Our meals are delivered to our door (no choices) in brown paper bags which are placed on the floor outside our door, and we get a knock. On hearing the knock we must wait at least 1 minute, close the balcony door (to avoid cross draughts), open the bathroom door and turn on the exhaust fan, wash our hands and don a mask. Only then are we allowed to open the door to pick up our meals. This procedure also applies to anything else that is delivered. We are not permitted to open our door at any other time, except when the health nurses come to give us a COVID test, or to put out rubbish or used linen.

Nor are we permitted to set foot in the corridor for any reason (except perhaps in an emergency). The food is all in disposable containers, with disposable cutlery. Our rubbish, and there is a lot of it, must be placed in a plastic bag (provided), tied securely and placed outside our door, to be collected.

We are tested for COVID on days 1, 5 and 10. When the nurses knock we must go through the same procedure as previously described. We still cannot step outside the door, and the nurses cannot enter the room, so the test is done across the threshold.

If we want to go onto the balcony, we must wear a mask.

Having said all this, the food is OK; nutritious, if not always what we might choose. Breakfast is delivered along with lunch on the previous day, and is therefore continental only.

We are managing to keep busy. Murray has some work to do on the computer and I have books, puzzle books and knitting. We are also exercising as much as we can. We are currently in day 6 of our quarantine and looking forward to our release on Nov. 10th. Welcome to Queensland!!

NORTH INDIA UPDATE

As you all know many of the supporters of the Woman & Child Community Health project in North India have knitted, sewn and created items to sell here in Australia. Funds raised have then been transferred to the Diocese of Amritsar for use in the JBKS program by Dr Alma and her team.

Simultaneously, with our support and encouragement, Dr Alma has formed self-help groups in her districts in the Punjab for women to create their own social enterprises and become more self-sustaining. They have knitted and sewn goods - some using the traditional folk embroidery of



the region called Phulkari - and have boosted their low income through sales.

Recently Dr Alma and her team arranged for the women to sell some of their goods at a mini fete outside Christ Church Cathedral, Amritsar in partnership with women from a similar organisation called Building Bridges India. So uplifting to see the women's empowerment in action.

Alma has also helped some illiterate women apply for widows pensions, bottom picture, (which she also agitated local government to be increased from \$5 per month to \$15 in her region.)

The Joy of Christmas Carols

One of the most joyful things about Christmas is the music associated with it. Everybody knows the words and melodies of dozens of Christmas Carols but they do not realise the origins and stories behind many of the best loved Christmas tunes.

O COME ALL YE FAITHFUL dates

originally from the year 1757 when it was known by its Latin name "Adeste Fidelis" – a name still used today. In many parts of the world it is known as the Portuguese hymn, although it has no connexion with that country

OH LITTLE TOWN OF BETHLEHEM

is one of the few original American carols and was written as a poem by Philip Brooks, a Sunday school teacher in 1865. The children of the Sunday School urged organist Louis Redner to set the words to music and the story goes that a melody evaded him until one Christmas Eve when he awoke to hear the now well-known tune playing in his head. He wrote it down and presented it to Sunday School the next morning, Christmas Day.

GOD REST YOU MERRY,

GENTLEMEN was written by an anonymous poet about 1800 and immortalised in Charles Dickens "A Christmas Carol." Interesting to note is the position of the comma in the title. This is often omitted leaving us with the unintended reference to "merry gentlemen".

WHAT CHILD IS THIS is the title of the Carol written by William Chatterton Dix that transposed the melody Greensleeves into a charming Christmas Carol. The original tune has been attributed to Henry VIII.

SILENT NIGHT or in the original German, "Stille Nacht" has a fascinating story. On Christmas Eve 1818 in the small town of Oberndorf, Bavaria the organ was found to be broken and the vicar found himself with the prospect of having a Christmas service with no music. He showed the local schoolmaster some verses he had written and asked him if he could set them to music. In a matter of a few hours the immortal Silent Night was born It was sung that evening to the accompaniment of the schoolmaster's guitar. The Carol was taken to the world by the Von Trapp family singers as they travelled abroad over the next ten years.

OH HOLY NIGHT also known as the "Cantique de Noel" was one of the few works of French composer Adolphe Adam who is best remembered for his ballet Giselle.

HARK THE HERALD ANGELS SING has an intriguing story. Felix Mendelssohn composed the melody in 1840 to celebrate Gutenberg's invention of the printing press. Eight years after Mendelssohn's death William H Cummings combined the melody with some verses written by Charles Wesley over 100 years before.

THE FIRST NOEL is one of the oldest carols known. This simple folk melody was called "The Shepherds Carol" originally in England although it is thought to have originated in France.

DECK THE HALLS is a traditional Welsh winter Carol celebrating the pagan Yuletide. Through the ages it has become associated with the Christian festival.

THE LITTLE DRUMMER BOY is often called "The Carol of the Drum" it has a definite medieval ring about it yet it was actually written as recently as 1958 and was introduced into the Christmas repertoire by the Harry Simeon chorale.

THE COVENTRY CAROL has the blackest of origins. Originally sung in the 16th century by Guild members at the Coventry Nativity festival the carol is a delightful lullaby describing the massacre of the innocents by Herod directly after Christ's birth.

and finally the tale of GOOD KING

WENCESLAS tells of a 10th century bohemian ruler Wenceslav who was one of the earliest Christian kings. His good works and acts of kindness, one of which is recounted in the Carol, so angered his family that they slew him. The tune is a rousing March which originated as a Swedish spring song.
