

Back at the start of my ordained ministry, I attended a set of studies on adaptive change in churches. One strong message that I hold from those studies is the important truth – people don't fear change, they fear loss. And I think an important reason for that is our experience of all the changes over the last fifty years has been loss. Loss of safety, loss of 'down time', loss of friendly neighbourhood shops, loss of community life, loss of privacy, and loss of personal

connection. Other people, through the changes in politics, may feel a loss of power or a loss of place in society. Because of all that loss, there seems to be an abiding grief in our society now: an unstated grief that shows itself because the symptoms look a lot like the stages of grief – denial, anger, bargaining and depression.

Some might look at our culture and our society now and think, "The world looks sad". Some people have adapted and made it through to acceptance, and of course, the newer generations have no idea that something has been lost, for them this is how the world is. But for many, particularly in the older generations, so much has been lost that our society is looking like a foreign country.

Our churches are more than just a representative group or a subset of this, I see people in the church suffering this grief even more than those in the general society. For many in churches this is a grief that is reinforced every week when we see the loss of people, the loss of children, the loss of social standing, even the loss of Sunday! And there is that unspoken but abiding grief, and symptoms of grief as each of us are in different stages of grieving.

But it needn't be all doom and gloom. Indeed, it needn't be a cause of grief. Most of those we have lost were never really members; church was more about socialisation than faith, or, like the parable, they were not deeply rooted in the faith. The ones who are members now want to be here and want to do what is necessary to continue the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ. The loss of people needn't mean a loss of faith or a loss of purpose and possibility. Our faith is not shaped by how many people are sitting around us on a Sunday morning but the One who is with us every day. Our scriptural heritage is filled with small numbers of people doing amazing things. People who always looked at what they had, and not at what they may have lost. Jesus told his disciples not to focus on the family and traditions that they left behind to follow him, but to look at what they gained in the community of followers.

We needn't be caught in grief but see a time of opportunity. Opportunity to offer a lot of what society feels they have lost, and to address the grief that we see around us. We can be agents of hope. We can be a place of safety, a place of social connection and community life, a place of gentle reflection and down time, and a place of friendly neighbours. For people who feel lost in the enormous, connected, global village we can be a smaller, personal village centre. Rather than getting caught up in the grief of change, let us be the people who address grief with the comfort of community, faith, and hope.

On the Road to the Assembly 2024

Preparations have begun for the 17th Assembly of the Uniting Church in Australia which will take place in Sydney from 11-16 July in 2024.

Assembly General Secretary Colleen Geyer said it was an exciting time as Presbyteries and Synods finalise their members and planning begins in earnest for the triennial decision-making meeting of the Church's national council. "We are officially on the road to the 17th Assembly!" said Ms Geyer. "National assemblies are always a significant event in the life of the Church as members gather together in worship, form community and discern together the movement of the Spirit in the life of the Church."

President-elect Rev Charissa Suli is delighted to announce the theme for the 17th Assembly and the next triennium, "Threads of Love, Weaving Christ's Love Across Cultures and Boundaries".

Inspired by the honoured Tongan tradition of weaving the fala (mat), the theme speaks to our God-

given call to weave Christ's love into the world by building bridges across social and cultural divides. "Each strand of the fala is important to each other in the same way that the Holy Spirit gifts and empowers all members of the Church to confess Jesus Christ and serve him," said Rev Suli. The phrase "Threads of Love" is a reference to Paul's Letter to the Colossians (3:14) and spotlights the transformative power of Christ's love as it overcomes cultural boundaries and unities us in God's service. The President-elect said she was further inspired by the story of the Samaritan woman's encounter with Jesus at the well in which Jesus traverses cultural and religious divides to engage in deep theological dialogue with the woman, who in turn is transformed by and becomes a beacon of Christ's love. "My hope is that the theme inspires us to acknowledge and honour our shared humanity in God our creator, and to act upon our common duty to shape a world that mirrors the love and unity Christ has for us all."



Ash Wednesday, the traditional start of Lent is coming fast – February 14, and many Christian minds turn to the age-old question, "What am I giving up for Lent?" In more recent years Lent has been seen as a journey of discipleship, mirroring the Early Church practice of preparing candidates for baptism during Lent, rather than a pious time of abstaining from pleasures. In that vein consider giving up bad habits or bad thoughts – judgement, anger, envy, prejudice – or consider taking up a new, good habit – daily devotion, Bible reading, letter writing – because research shows that habits develop or change in about 6 weeks. That's the length of Lent.

May Lent bring you closer to God to experience a deeper, more meaningful Easter celebration.

VALE Patti Scully Dec 1945 – Dec 2023

We were all very saddened with the passing of Patti Scully just before Christmas. What follows is the eulogy presented by Ley Mackintosh for those who missed the beautiful service.

Firstly, I would like to extend my sympathies to Patti's family – to James. Megan, James, Sophie, Charlie and Rosemary.

I know for a fact that she loved you all very much.

Can I offer you a quote from the composer Irving Berlin – The song may be ended but the melody lives on.

Patti was born in Broadford in 1945, the youngest of 6 children to her parents who lived and worked in Strath Creek. Her childhood was filled with fun, freedom and laughter and she said she always felt treasured and loved.

She attended Strath Creek Primary {which was a one room school with 12 pupils} and Seymour High. After obtaining her Leaving Certificate she came to Melbourne and worked at the Commercial Bank of Sydney.

Patti met her future husband Alan at church youth group, and they married in 1971 They were blessed when first James arrived in 1974 and Megan completed the family in 1979. Patti spent 17 years working at Peninsula Special Development School as a Teacher's Assistant where she was able to make a profound difference in the lives of many children. She was always kind and positive and the children responded to this. The school encouraged Patti to gain extra qualifications including her bus driver's licence and she even completed the Transport Management Course in Bus and Coach operations, so she was responsible for the 3 buses the school owned. – how she could see over the steering wheel, manage the disabled children on trips and not lose her cool beats me but she loved the kids and her job caring for them. When Patti's husband Alan was diagnosed with Muscular Dystrophy in 1992 and with his health failing her decision to leave work and care for him was an easy one.

I first met Patti at Wesley when our children were small. We shared a friendship with many interests and activities in common.

We joined LEGS, became Elders, taught Sunday school, helped with Community Breakfast, formed Ametie, walked with the Walkie Talkies and for several years formed part of a worship planning committee – a busy and varied life you will agree.

Soroptimists International was a special interest for Patti and she treasured her organisational roles and the friends she made at the club.

While it is tragic to think about Patti leaving us so soon, she has left behind a lifetime of memories we can celebrate, from her two children, her two grandchildren, her extended family, her many friends, her beautifully tended garden and her trust in The Lord.

She was independent and strong through life's difficulties and challenges. She was a kind, positive, gentle woman of courage and determination and we will all miss her
