From the Minister... Rev Ross Writes

It sometimes seems that everywhere we look, there are commentators predicting the demise of Christianity in the western word. There are forces and social changes threatening the existence of the church; rational thought, science and technology, individualism, alternate faiths, social media, sport on Sunday, seven-day trading, and so on. Many of us have lived through the steep decline in membership of the church, not just the number of members but the number of churches as well. As a young man I remember a couple of hundred in Sunday School; when I became a teacher in Sunday School, we had 6. When I first attended Presbytery meetings in the 1980's there were 26 Uniting churches in Geelong and suburbs, there are now 11. Even though over that same time the population of Geelong has increased astronomically! You will all have similar stories, I am sure. This is a sadness in many congregations, with tinges of grief and guilt. But I wonder if we are too self-focussed and caught up in nostalgia. Even the Teacher, who wrote the book of Ecclesiastes 2500 years ago chastised people for saying, "Weren't the former days better than these?"

Maybe we are over-thinking things, and what we are seeing is not a massive rejection of religion but the exit of people who were only in the church for social and cultural reasons. Yes, it is true that we have failed to keep the Gospel fresh and relevant in thought and language, for many people, however religion is simply not needed for their lives! The social and cultural role of the churches in the early twentieth century is now filled with entertainment, sport, social media and the 'café culture'. Many people aren't rejecting our faith, they have never really heard or encountered it, for them it's just an old religion. A rethinking of our situation opens all sorts of possibilities by focussing us on faith and not religion, by shifting us from looking to the past to looking to the world now.

For many it is more than an issue of attendance numbers. We are no longer the centre of social life or an institution of respect and authority. If we are no longer the social centre, we need to ask ourselves seriously, what do we offer the world? If we are no longer the carriers of culture, what can we share with the world? The answers to those questions can then drive our ministry; community for the lonely, care for the vulnerable, and a place to be yourself without judgement. We can be free to refocus on who we really are; the carriers of the Gospel of God's love in Jesus Christ, the offer of love and acceptance, and meaning for the confused.

Not being the respected centre of society is a big challenge and a bit scary, but it is also the place of God that shines in the Beatitudes and in Acts, a place built on faith and trust in God and not on power and influence and position. I don't think the decline we have witnessed is leading to the demise of Christianity because we are the people of God and not just people with a philosophy.

Uniting Church Assembly - ACT 2

Initiated by the Assembly Standing Committee in 2020 and affirmed at the last Assembly meeting in 2021/2, some serious work was undertaken towards imagining and working for the future of the church. This work was given the title Act2. A name that picks up both the idea of a follow up to the initial work in forming the Uniting Church and the work of the Spirit in Acts Chapter 2.

While this may look like a bit of navel gazing instead of positive direction or initiative, it is becoming increasingly clear that our church is structured and governed by regulations written for a much larger church than we are now. What should the focus be for our diminishing resources? Act2 is seeking the collective wisdom of Uniting Church people to shape what it means to follow Jesus here and now.

Guided by a Project Plan that aims to make a report to the next Assembly Meeting in 2024, working to a timeline of three phases – we are now entering the Discernment Phase - the Act2 work is focussed on four streams of enquiry:

- Local communities of faith and discipleship
- National identity
- Governance and resourcing
- Theological culture and education

There are resources to enable congregations to think through the issues of being a faithful church now and into the future. If you would like to see a conversation or presentation here in High St, please talk to me. The focus of the Act2 Project and the Assembly right now is Uniting in Prayer. Between Pentecost and the anniversary of the Uniting Church there is a national time of prayer for 26. Resources for Uniting in Prayer will be available in the foyer for all those who are interested.

The Assembly website – act2uca.com - contains a lot of material on the Act2 project and ways for people to engage in this important work, and I encourage us all to participate in this time of self-examination with a hopeful and faithful view to the future.

"We are very happy this month to profile some of the wonderful outreach that is happening from our church premises on Saturday mornings. Project Fresh Start and Mother's Kitchen collaborate by working alternate weekends to produce delicious and healthy hot meals for anyone who might need it. People are welcome to attend and sit down for a meal, or take some food away, and there is of course invaluable social connection and fellowship happening during the meals. We give thanks for Jo and Jolene, the leaders of each group, and their inspiring volunteers who make all this happen."

Mother's Kitchen (MK)

This fortnightly community lunch aims to provide a service to support those members of the community who experience food insecurity and may not have access to regular nutritious meals. Those who experience hardship- economic, social, housing - and may be marginalised within the local community. We provide healthy and nutritiously cooked vegetarian meals in a safe and supportive dining environment where people can feel part of a community and share a meaningful social experience. Currently there is an increasing number of people in the community seeking food assistance.

Meals are prepared in the UC kitchen and then served in the church hall from 12pm - 1pm. Take away meals are also given out. Everyone is welcome.

MK has a dedicated team and team leader who together prepare and serve the meals.

Fresh produce is collected from Community Support Frankston.

Staples and dry goods are purchased or donated to augment fresh fruit and vegetables provided.

Mother's Kitchen is part of the Amrita Australia Pty Ltd Charity (AAL).





Project Fresh Start

We are a plant-based not-for-profit organization that takes food waste and turns it into delicious healthy fee meals for our community via our Community Fridge which is located at the needle exchange in Frankston on Young St as well as our fortnightly Saturday lunches where we welcome people into the hall and often entertain with our volunteer musicians.

We cook up to 400 meals a week for the community fridge and the need is rising along with the cost of living.

We have strong connections with Community Support Frankston as well as the Bayside community kitchen and assist both these organizations to meet the need of our most disadvantaged community members.
