Rev Ross Writes



In a collegial group a few years ago, we were talking about themes and readings for preaching.

One colleague said that instead of following the Lectionary, he was doing a four-week series on Ephesians, to which another colleague asked if he had told them where Ephesus was. It was a bit of a joke, but it started a conversation about the role of teaching in preaching and how preachers cannot assume that our congregations have a robust level of Biblical knowledge. I have heard some ministers say that they preach on themes from readings and not the reading itself because it takes too long to explain all the background and details of the who, when and where of the text and the

story.

This is not an indictment of people in our congregations, but rather a comment on the 'culture' of our denomination, where Bible studies and Bible knowledge are not rated very important. There seems to be an understanding that all that knowledge comes from Sunday School, or your own devotions and learning, or, that it is indeed the task of the preacher to be a teacher as well. I think this is a post-Christendom reality check for us. In a church where more people are entering with no church or Sunday School background, we need to develop a culture of Bible study and Bible knowledge. In a culture where the church is increasingly marginalised, we need to model to our children and young families that the Bible is important and understanding its background is important. In a world where more people are trying to use Biblical quotes to justify their moral or political positions, particularly on social media, we need to have a better knowledge of the Bible, its origins and compilation over 1000 years, its structure as a collection of books, its multi-layered purposes, and its variety of genres.

There are plenty of excellent introductory books on the Bible available, however I think some basics might be helpful.

- Consult the study guides and maps and illustrations in your Bible if you have them.
- Ask questions of the passages and the books. Who was the writer and when did they write? What was happening amongst the people of God and in the world at the time of the writing? What sort of book is this, history, poetry, prophecy, gospel, letter?
- Recognise that the books of the Bible were written in another language and culture, and some things don't translate directly.
- Be aware that the chapters and verses were added in the Middle Ages to help readers, and the paragraphs and headings were added only recently.

If people are willing and interested, I am always ready to do some presentations or studies on the Bible, its origins, structure and purposes, and the characters and history behind what we have as scripture. Maybe people would prefer information sheets on the background to the books and stories being referred to in the Lectionary each week. Biblical literacy is important for people to add understanding and depth to their faith; never more so than now, when it seems that the only options that our society is being presented with are 'old, outdated stories', or 'the infallible, literal word of God'.

As part of our commitment to social justice by actively supporting those in need within our local community, HSUC is integrally connected with Operation Larder, the Wednesday barbeque, and other initiatives. So, when the community 'Brekky Club' made contact in January to seek our permission to temporarily use our facilities, due to the need for them to move from Chisholm TAFE, after ensuring that an appropriate user agreement was completed, we happily agreed. This has been a successful arrangement and enabled this key community support activity to continue whilst a new permanent site is finalised.

Budget for 2024

We are all only too well aware of the stringent and challenging financial climate which surrounds us. As a church we are similarly impacted, with the rising costs of utilities, insurance and other operational elements and building repairs and maintenance. Moreover, as some people have departed from our midst, the available funds from our planned giving have declined. Thankfully, the hiring of our facilities by many external groups and organisations partially offsets some of our financial commitments. We are much blessed to have the devoted skills and oversight of our Treasurer, Keith Holmes, who together with his assistant, Emma Lindenburg is managing our budget. Please be aware, however that this will be a very challenging year to try to cover all our costs.

Organ recitals

Thanks to our wonderful Choir leader, Bronwen Mathews, an exciting initiative for 2024 is the plan to present up to three organ recitals at different points in the year on Saturday afternoons. Did you realise that our Aeolian pipe organ is historic, special and wonderfully versatile, even if its pipes are well-hidden behind the wooden screen at the back of the church? Many would recall the two wonderful organ recitals with Lachlan Redd several years ago (pre-COVID!). Bronwen has used her sleuthing skills to ascertain that we have another talented pipe organist in the local area, Chris Cook. So, make another note in your diary- Saturday 4 May- will be the first recital! Funds raised will help with the upkeep of the organ and ensuring a musical presence is supported in our church.

Management Committee

We are very fortunate to have the expertise, dedication and determined hard work of Michael Guest, Alan Jenkins and Robert Downing in overseeing our suite of buildings. They work tirelessly and are continually seeking to ensure not only that everything is safe and operational, but complies with complex Synod building requirements. This is precisely why we held our first ever fire drill on 21 January. They had previously ensured that all new, requisite exit signs had been installed. The first removal of asbestos roofing (from the rear lean-to shed) will commence soon...and so the vast list continues!

A recycling initiative!

Thanks to our wonderful and industrious gardening group convenor, Anita Setterfield and her husband Dennis, Church Council readily embraced a way to both encourage recycling, as well as adding to church coffers!

Michael Guest has purchased a special wheelie bin, which is labelled for recycled bottles and cans (which must be intact with a visible bar code). We are inviting you to bring your bag of such recyclable bottles and cans when you visit the church and place them in this bin. When the bin is full, Dennis has kindly offered to take these to the Frankston Victorian government recycling depot where these will be converted into church funds. This is both convenient and mutually beneficial, is it not?!


