



Next a move to Deer Park and further studies at Melbourne Uni including Syriac and Arabic with an eye to working in the Middle East. After a stint as Victorian Secretary to Methodist Overseas Missions he married Ann in 1969 and headed off to Tonga for a number of years. More travel followed with work in Los Angeles then back to Australia via Scotland, Scandinavia and more time in India finally finishing at Scots Shepparton. After Union John was minister at both Wesley in Frankston and Doncaster East before retiring in 2005. Since retiring John has been busy with lots of interim work including Brighton, Beaumaris, Berwick, Coatesville and others, more involvement in Tonga and plenty of Mission work which has taken him to many countries to enjoy world assemblies or international meetings.

The colder weather in Melbourne really helped sales of woollen knitwear and other items at the May Fete.

Goods on the stall were made by women in the villages in Punjab and Australian churchwomen. It felt good to be back on the fundraising trail for this important project in villages surrounding Amritsar, led by Dr Alma Ram. Our church has supported the project to help women and children in North India for eight years.

Transformative change goes on in Amritsar and Punjab as Alma Ram and her colleagues continue with training programs for the self-help groups. Alma explained: "We were teaching on how and what is needed to be an animator in your village/city. This is a person who can illuminate and empower in their village on gender and past thinking over harmful traditions."

Social Justice Report

One of David's final initiatives for High Street Frankston was a call for those interested in forming a social justice group to gather for a discussion. About 10 people responded. We now have a Social Justice Group which meets on the first Thursday of each month, either in the Green room, or on Zoom (Covid is still with us!!).



Social Justice is a broad church. There are countless areas of concern, and we identified several on which we wish to focus, these being:

- The Uluru Statement from the Heart,
- The environment, and
- The plight of refugees.

Another area could perhaps be awareness raising in general. Many in our wider church are unaware of just how much the 'Justice and International Mission Cluster of the Synod of Victoria and Tasmania' does, and as a way of sharing this information, I have arranged for extra copies of their quarterly publication to be delivered to us. They are placed on the table in the foyer, and I urge you to give them a glance. I think you will be amazed at the breadth of issues in which they/we involve ourselves.


Their vision statement is as follows:

'Following Christ, walking together as First and Second Peoples, seeking community, compassion and justice for all of creation.'

How easy it is to feel helpless in the face of our troubled times, and yet, there is always something we can do. Sometimes we do feel drawn towards, or angered by, a particular situation. The JIM Cluster offers ways in which we can help.

Actions which can be taken include:

- Petitions
- Postcard campaigns
- Email campaigns
- Lobbying visits with or without Church Ministers and Members
- Public art displays
- Media Coverage
- Research reports.





Dr Mark Zirnsak is the director of the JIM Cluster, and for me, one of the jewels in the crown of the Uniting Church. He has good relations and pretty ready access to people of influence across the board, and has offered his assistance to us, in any way he can.

As you are probably aware, we are contemplating a banner for outside our building, and have called for suggestions. We have in mind several speakers at some future date to talk about homelessness in the Frankston area; both are works in progress at this stage, watch this space.

A Personal Reflection on Care for the Environment


Back in 1976, while training for ministry, I wrote an essay 'Belief in God as Creator and human responsibility for the environment'. It was based on the premise that God is creator of all life and that, because we are made in God's image and likeness, we are to enjoy and care for the natural world.

At a recent meeting of High Street Uniting Church's Social Justice Group, when we listed key areas we might address, I said the most urgent issue before the world is addressing climate change. There are a number of reasons for this:




- if we don't look after our home, we may not have a home to live in.
- forests are the lungs of the world producing oxygen and habitat that God's

creatures might live. The rates they are being cut down threaten animal and human life.



There is an issue that is often neglected when we talk about environmental care and climate change; and it flows from a misunderstanding of the biblical account of creation. Soon after the affirmation that we are made in the image and likeness of God, we read: God said to us, 'Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth.' (Genesis 1:28)

Most often, we have interpreted 'subdue it and have dominion over ...' to mean the world and its produce is a commodity available for our use. Such a stance ignores the call to 'be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth' or assumes that this relates to giving birth to children. But, as in Psalm 23, which I preached on recently, our relationship with God is so bountiful and life-giving that we can sing out in joy, "My cup runneth over!"



companion'; to be understood in terms relationships – to be seen, its voice listened to.



It is for these reasons, and more, that I love to be out and about in nature; to travel slowly in and through places of beauty – allowing them to enrich me and breathe me to life as I sit and watch a sunset or walk through a local Flora and Fauna Reserve or photograph Port Phillip Bay or a kookaburra as it laughs out loud. Perhaps the images you see here will invite you to see God's creation in a different way.

Thankyou Brenda for this cautionary tale.

To my Frankston Church Family,

I recently had a horrible experience which I wish to share with you, in the hope that you may not find yourselves in the same situation.

Last Friday week I was on the internet searching for Cocker Spaniel puppies (Well! I won't be doing that! I can hear you say!). Suddenly, I received from Microsoft, an alert, warning me that my computer had been hacked, and



showed me a number which I should ring. I took it to be legitimate, because I do pay Microsoft to protect from such an occurrence. So I rang it. Enter 'Eric', who very patiently asked me to check on all of my sources of income and see whether anything had been taken from any of my accounts. I wasn't keen to do this, and started asking questions as to his identity, and location. He was from the Fraud squad, a government department, but meanwhile, I was not to speak to anyone about this call, not my computer 'guru', or friend or family member, as it was important we track these hackers, and 'we don't want any leaks'.

I became quite agitated, because I was unsure of the transfer process, I also had my remaining Cocker Spaniel, Barnaby, up at the vets having biopsies on lumps in his spleen, a stress in itself, as I waited for a phone call from them as to whether I may lose my second dog within a month (he's fine, benign lumps, within normal limits for old dogs, he's 13). Eric realised I was anxious and suggested that I get some rest over the weekend and that we continue Monday morning. He rang me Saturday and Sunday, to check I was ok, and reminded me of our appointment at 8:00am on Monday. Meanwhile, he set me up with a Hong Kong based account (HSBC), where I could transfer everything for safe keeping. I gave him quite a bit of info to do this.

I was also becoming frustrating to him, because I couldn't remember passwords here and there, and he promptly opened the 'saved passwords' document, while I looked on. As I clearly became more annoying, he transferred me up the line to 'Daniel'. To cut to the chase, I rang my guru, who said 'I don't THINK it's a scam, I KNOW it is!'. He came later and spent 3 hours 'cleaning' my computer, meanwhile, I visited both my banks, who were marvelous. I now have new numbers, new cards etc which all took about one week.



I feel quite stupid revisiting this incident, but at the time it felt reali, and was very frightening....

So please, be aware of such messages, ring Microsoft should a similar thing happen to you, and verify any such claims.

The last bit of information is that I didn't find a puppy on the internet, but I did, through a friend who has Springer Spaniels, and on Tuesday next I am collecting my Springer Spaniel puppy from the airport. she is gorgeous,

Barnaby can't wait! Her name is Pansy.

So here we all are, David, some 6 years after you we welcomed into this congregational family as our minister, too soon heading off to your next call to be our collective Moderator. So, we must bid you *adieu*- God be with you- but not before we acknowledge some highlights of your time with us and try to articulate your legacy, whilst also recognising the inevitable sadness and sense of loss at your departure. It is bitter/ sweet, as you have noted.

David, throughout your time with us, you have revealed your exceptional capacity to listen intently to the needs and concerns of others, to resist making hasty and ill-informed decisions and to enact Christ's love to each and every one of us. We have been nurtured, supported and upheld by you and we thank you for this. You have truly ministered to our needs, whilst still ensuring that we have still been encouraged to grow spiritually as individuals and as a congregation. Through all of this, your customary and trademark fruity laugh has reminded us of your warmth, care and humanity as God's people in this place.

When you assumed the role as our spiritual leader here, we all embarked on a shared journey, not knowing precisely the route we would take, nor with what challenges and unexpected situations we would be collectively confronted. None of us could ever have predicted the advent of COVID-19 and its consequences, could we? Yet, as our ever-reliable leader, we have always confidently known that your hand has been guiding the tiller of our vessel riding the sometimes-rough seas, rather aptly considering our proximity to the sea and Port Phillip Bay. I would encourage everyone to once more gaze at the inspiration provided by the external stained glass of St Andrew as you leave today. At your inauguration as minister here, I happened to be seated with some of your flock from your former church (Ashwood). Their comments have once more resounded in my ears. They noted how warm, caring and approachable you were, and how much you nurtured them and thus how much they would miss your special presence. Now, in May 2022, we can readily echo their sentiments based on our own experiences.

Allow me to use your first name to highlight some of your special attributes:

D Dedicated to your sense of spiritual guidance and determined to proffer the cumulative wisdom and insights gleaned from the Bible. For most ministers, one of the most challenging aspects of their role is to develop and present a weekly sermon which enlivens and prompts reflection, if not action- as opposed to numbing their congregation. Your sermons David so naturally and powerfully weave in the realities of the moment- whether this be natural disasters in East Gippsland or northern NSW or Fiji or Samoa, or climate change, or real acknowledgement and support for our First Nation's people or the ongoing challenges presented by the pandemic or the victims of Putin's drive into Ukraine- and reveal the potency and undiminished relevance of Christ's words and advice. These have been special spiritual gifts to each of us, based on your own devotion to our shared Lord.

A Astute in your assessments of situations, accomplished as an administrator and approachable in the advice and leadership offered to key groups including Church Council and the Ministry Team. David, you have approached the challenges and issues which have inevitably faced us with consideration, a desire to garner all the facts and due deliberation. These skills will be well used in your role as Moderator, I am sure! We will most assuredly miss your wise and considered counsel.

V Visionary in your sense of potential ways for our congregation to operate and to extend outreach into the community, as shown in our rapid and seamless transition to Zoom services and the establishment of our Friday Playgroup and Social Justice Group. You have readily explored opportunities and means by which we might operate more effectively and in new ways. Thank you.

I Initiative apparent in overseeing the development of a COVID-Safety oversight group and continually revisiting rules and requirements. As a congregation we were always ready to as seamlessly as possible transition to the next stage of set of governmental rules or Synod advice. Industry and intense input in managing a diverse and very considerable workload, balancing the requirements of being a father largely alone with 2 teenagers and at a distance, of key external Synod committees and expectations and the shifting needs within our own church.

D Devoted to sharing, celebrating and extolling God's love for each of us in so many special and memorable ways. As you have reminded us and urged us to reveal such love: rejoice and be gentle!

So, David, the time has come for High Street Uniting Church to part company with you. Of course, given that your exuberant marriage to your soulmate Robyn occurred in this place, I am sure that you both will always hold this place and its people in a special place in your hearts. Likewise, as you leave, you may feel well-pleased that, you leave in your wake, as your vessel sails into new and largely unchartered waters, a vibrant and active congregation, ready to continue to be God's people in this place, as the next chapter in our journey unfolds.

In closing, may I draw from the words of Dame Nellie Melba, in her last onstage performance in Melbourne-David, we *fare thee well*, but do not say goodbye, which is much too final, not that I am implying that this will

be one of a series of farewells for which Melba was most famous!




