### Church Council Report - April 2021 Meeting

Your Church Council again met, on 13 April, with our two re-elected members present, Kerry Pederick and Marg Scarlett. We also acknowledged the valuable contribution of Juli Lincoln, who chose not to seek re-election.

In keeping with more efficient meeting practice, as recommended by Presbytery, we distributed key reports prior to the meeting so that these could be read and considered, but not spoken about directly unless there were key decisions to be made. This enhanced process enables more time for discussion about important matters requiring careful discernment. In addition, we have now instigated the recommended UCA practice of using orange (support for a proposal), yellow(a question to be posed) and blue (cool on a proposal) cards to assist with inclusive decision-making and a more effective consensual approach to decision-making.

#### Covid Oversight Group recommendations

At its most recent meeting (13 April), reflected on the implications of the most recent Presbytery and government advice. It will be a requirement, as of 25 April, for QR registration to be used by all people using our buildings, including worshippers and outside groups. Recognising that not all people have a smart phone, or are confident in using the necessary App, a person will be on hand to assist everyone to register before worship.

Another key area is that of food handling in a Post-COVID environment. There will be new signage in the kitchens to clarify the rules relating to handing and serving food. In addition, there will be strict limitations about the number of people who can be located in these spaces at any one time. All facility hirers are also being notified of these regulations.

At this stage, there will still need to be physical distancing which will prevent passing the peace, sharing offering bowls or communion, and shaking hands at the door.

The Group will continue to monitor this important area of concern to ensure safety for all!

#### <u>Other groups</u>

It is wonderful that so many of the community groups and organisations, including the Chinese congregation who have typically used our suite of buildings are now able to return, albeit with strict COVID-safe protocols in place. Jacqui is continuing to liaise with these groups to ensure compliance as required.

#### Pipe Organ Repair Update

At last, the essential repairs to the wind chest of our historic Aeolian organ are scheduled to commence this month. This has been possible thanks to donations from congregational members, a generous \$10,000grant by the Collier foundation and some of our own funds. We can now look forward to completion of these and being able to hear its clear, strong and inspiring tones resonate once more in the near future!

#### 2021 Fete: Saturday 8 May !

As a real sign that the worst of the pandemic is- hopefully- now behind us, Church Council happily could warmly endorse the plan to hold a pre- Mother's Day fete on 8 May (after a year of no such events in 2020). For this to occur, we do need to ensure it is a COVID-safe event and so some special arrangements will need to be made. Again, we are indebted to Marg Scarlett and her team for overseeing this complex organisational event. No doubt, you will want to participate and mention this event to all your friends and family.

#### Sale of the former Wesley buildings

Under the lease agreement made with the Brotherhood of St Laurence, following the amalgamation of the former St Andrews and Wesley congregations into one entity we know as High Street UC, there was an option for BSL to purchase the whole site after 20 years in 2023. BSL has indicated that it wishes to bring forward this date as soon as possible, given that it has been developing the site extensively and has established the David Scott School. After careful consideration, Church Council authorised Keith Holmes, as Treasurer, to begin this complex process. It was recognised that the leasing arrangement has been critical to our finances since 2003 and we must be able to fund major future projects including essential maintenance works to our halls, which are so important to our missional activities. Therefore, we are hopeful that funds from this projected sale, will underpin our future.

#### **Chaplaincy**

The current Synod funding for the important role of Chaplain will end later this year. While we have reserves that can be put towards extending the role into 2021, we are unsure whether there will be potential Synod funding to apply for in the future. It was recognised that Synod Standing Committee will be meeting soon to determine the availability of funding. We endorsed the importance of this position and agreed that it may need to operate with a reduced time fraction in the future.

#### Preparing to look for a new Minister

Following Rev David Fotheringham's appointment as Moderator Elect, and his subsequent departure from our midst in the first part of 2022, it was recognised that we need to commence the considerable and lengthy process of looking for a new minister. We will write to Presbytery to initiate this process, which will commence with undertaking a mission study. Then a Joint Nominating Committee will need to be established, with 4–6 congregational members and 2 Presbytery representatives (one of whom will be the Chair).

Several people have been asking how our student houses and students fared with the big floods in Dili.

We are glad to report that our houses were not damaged, and our students are all ok, but this is a picture of the flood from our back yard. It would have been exciting. The students took their belongings to Sabino's two story house.

In the photo the water from the big river is right up to the back fence, it washed out all the foundations of our fence, (which will be quite expensive to replace), and the very productive vegetable garden that the students had grown on the other side of the fence.

Dili is in a bad way at the moment. They are in strict lockdown with the virus spreading. Schools and shops are closed, there is no work and people are hungry. Our students are working on zoom.

But five of our university students have now graduated, . We were not able to go to see them or join in the parties., but we are very proud of them.

And rather to our surprise he has done well and graduated in minimum time as an engineer, and his widowed mother is very proud of him and we are too. Almost all of the students have great personalities, but his is one of the most appealing.

The work we are carrying out at Frankston Uniting involves restoring the Swell windchest, the original Aeolian organ dating from 1913, made for a house in Mt Eliza called Manyung.

It was moved to the Church in 1939.

This windchest has a very complex design, and is very hard to repair anything because access is very difficult.

Each note on the organ has a round leather pouch about 2" round, and the leather is the original from 1913.

As you could imagine after 108 years, the leather has developed holes, tears and has started to perish. Notes have also stopped working, and this is because the pouch for that note has failed.

There are around 1000 pouches to replace in the windchest, and we will be sure to take lots of photos to share.

Tomorrow we are removing the windchest from the organ chamber, we have had to bring in lifting equipment.


